Retirement will see me stepping into the volunteer sector and I will be heading up the project to end Youth Homelessness in Toowoomba by 2024, giving some time to our deaf community who are very isolated, working in Collectables - a boutique Op Shop for people with a disability, and enjoying my first 2 new grandsons born in September. I have always heard that retirement is busier than working ... and I am looking forward to finding out how true that might be ... I suspect it is!"

From Toowoomba, Chloe is currently a secondyear student of a dual Bachelors' degree of Business (Human Resources) and Arts (Economics) at the University of Queensland. She has excelled both in communication and leadership in her community.

As well as competing in debates and public speaking competitions herself, she has coached younger students and adjudicated debates. She has also studied tertiary units in the Communication field. Chloe has demonstrated her commitment to leadership in the community through her volunteering work with the Institute of Continuing & TESOL Education, the Smith family and Girl Guides, and taking executive positions with on-campus societies.

Last semester Chloe achieved a GPA of 7 and received the Dean's Commendation for Academic Excellence. This demonstrates her commitment to her full-time studies, whilst also working part-time.

VALE – LILLIAN SHELTON

Gympie Forum members are mourning the death of their long time member and valued friend, Lillian Shelton. Lillian joined Gympie Forum in early 1984. From the start, she was an active member, always ready with a speech. This continued right up until

their August social meeting this year. With her many years of teaching and her extensive travelling, Lillian had a wealth of material for her speeches, though she never resorted to anecdotal speeches.

Lillian became an assessor (for both speech and procedure) early in her Forum career. Her assessments were always to the point, kindly and encouraging. She was the convenor of "The Hills Are Alive" convention. Over the years Lillian held all executive positions. She will be remembered for her sense of humour too. When encouraging fellow members to take executive positions one year, Lillian brought her stock whip in and proceeded to "round us up". We think Lillian was the first to use a theme for session speeches.

Lillian was a valued member of Gympie Forum and also made a major contribution to Forum literature with the "Welcome to Forum" booklet which was attributed to Gympie Forum - but was mostly Lillian's work. Lillian was an inspiration and mentor to so many us in Forum. We will miss her.



At the age of 92, Lillian was Queensland's old registered teacher. Between 1943 and 1972 Lillian worked in dozens of schools as a teacher, relieving teacher and principal. After a stint as a teacher in the UK, her excellence was recognised in 1963 when she was asked to be the first principal of the Charters Towers School of the Air – the second School of the Air in Queensland. In 1973, while Principal of The Hall Girls and Infants School in Rockhampton, she was asked to be an Acting Inspector of Schools in Maryborough. The following year she made state history when she was named Queensland's first female District Inspector of Schools (primary) for the Western QLD region, based in Mount Isa.

Musings from an Ipswich Forum member

"I really love our Forum meetings, they are always innovative and designed to stretch us in our goal to become better speakers. Our first meeting for September was no exception, only it stretched us in a slightly different direction with humorous and fun activities.

We began with a lively presentation by Forum's Chief Assessor, Leanne Walker, on becoming a great communicator. Leanne shared with us her research into a subject we may not have thought to investigate on our own.

She helped us consider why women may often be their own worst enemy in a corporate setting.

As Forum members we are trained in using our speech making skills but sometimes we find comfort behind a lectern with a copy of our script close by. However, as women in the community or workplace we also have to look to developing our non-contextual confidence. In others words, to expand our conversational skills, to learn to speak up, to have a message and be brave enough to share it in a setting where sometimes the male voices dominate. To be able to answer questions, give directives and propose solutions to problems – all things that women do so well at home - but apparently not so well in public life"

Members practised delivering 'special occasion' speeches, something we all have to do at some stage of our lives, so this was a fun way for members to prepare themselves for the inevitable – and that's what Forum is all about!

At Forum's inaugural meeting on 30 July 1941, Miss Ruth Don was elected President. The name Forum Club was adopted to stress the link with Rostrum, and with the traditions of oratory in Ancient Rome.

The Club met over dinner so members could fit a meeting in between the day's activities and the war work that occupied their evenings. Many members went on to night patrol on the river, watching for enemy mines or with the Air Observer Corps, watching radar screens for enemy aircraft.

It was difficult to find a room where a meal could be had along with privacy for speakers. After several short term venues the Red Cross Café proved a happy home for over two years, in spite of some competition from wedding receptions and the distraction of the acrobatic rats racing around picture rails.
