ANNE HARRIS was a true gem in Ipswich Forum and had the determination to do whatever it takes. Her *out-of-the ordinary* experiences in life left her audience gasping as she often shared speech topics that related to her life. Anne was not your regular 85 year old and she had the courage to lead the way. Anne was greatly admired by her Forum friends, especially as she was willing to take on the Treasurer's role, which is a rarity in any group! On Saturday 17 September dear Anne had no choice but to leave our wonderful group as she departed from this earth. This was something that came as quite a shock to her many friends and especially her loving family. Anne's journey in Ipswich Forum started on February



28, 2008. Anne bravely spoke at her very next meeting to the title of "The Luck of the Irish" and has continued to speak as often as she could ever since. Most recently, Anne presented a main speech to the title Industrial Change on 28 July this year, a speech that enlightened us to the difficulties she faced as a young woman in what was clearly the era of the 'man's world' in the mining town of Broken Hill. Anne's willingness to take on the leadership roles of President and Treasurer

of her true determination and dedication to serve and lead in her community. Anne became a Forum Assessor which enabled her to provide sound feedback on meeting procedure & speechmaking in her own & other Forums.

Anne was heavily involved in several community groups where her Forum leadership skills and knowledge of the requirements of President & Treasurers' roles were greatly valued. These groups included F.O.I.L. (Friends of Ipswich Libraries); Art Classes; Australian Women's Register; Music Lessons and Spanish Group. This is a further reason why Anne was seen as a true gem to the Ipswich Community and she will be sadly missed by many.

VALE ALICE KNUDSEN

Members like ALICE KNUDSEN don't come along to Ipswich Forum every decade, let alone for almost two decades.

Alice joined our Forum in 1998 and through her many years of health issues that initially flared up in her early 70's, she continued to be a valuable contributor to our group and the wider Forum community – in spite of excruciating nerve pain caused by her diagnosed illness of Peripheral Neuropathy.

Her many interesting speeches delivered throughout her 19 year membership have been kept by Alice's family. It was in these speeches that Alice's wonderful sense of humour and imagination often came to the fore, and one of her most memorable speeches was an 'interview' created solely by Alice, who 'played' the unusual role of an inanimate object - that of Andre Rieu's famous Violin. In this speech Alice described the often unfortunate circumstances that the instrument found itself in, particularly being abandoned and locked away soon after providing a world class performance to a magnificent audience, while others went off partying. Alice was a true marvel!

Alice took on the roles of Secretary, Vice President and President on many occasions and within a few years of joining, Alice extended her participation in Forum, taking

on the role of Secretary of the South-East Regional Council.

Alice made use of the confidence she gained in Forum to serve her community as a volunteer at the Ipswich Art Gallery and also as a tour guide with the Ipswich Information Centre, which involved providing local information on guided bus tours around Ipswich. This experience enabled Alice and a fellow volunteer to lead a guided tour during a lunchtime outing at the Ipswich Forum Convention which was themed "Trains, Planes & Automobiles".

No one was more disappointed than Alice herself when she was forced to abandon her beloved Forum membership in late 2017 after her debilitating illness took over, and finally led to her passing on 25 August 2022.

Bremer Forum member Toni Risson is President of Women Writers Qld, and in that capacity, Toni has just released a collection of short stories about rain. And who better to launch it than ABC 'weather girl' Jenny Woodward.

Toni set her members the challenge of writing a story that begins, *If it hadn't rained that night*. The result was a deluge of stories, from crime fiction and mystery, to historical drama and romance. She was delighted when Jenny agreed to do the honours. 'Rain,' said Jenny, 'how could I resist?'

To the strains of *Raindrops Keep Falling on My Head* and *It's Raining Men*, Jenny launched the anthology on 13 September at the Brisbane Square Library in a room filled with umbrellas. The event opened with Gene Kelly's iconic dance routine from *Singin' in the Rain*.

The cover of *If it hadn't rained that night* features a painting by Brisbane painter David Hinchliffe, whose work was exhibited at the Red Hill Gallery throughout September. David loves Queensland thunderstorms and many of his paintings depict rainy streetscapes.

Jenny Woodward grew up in Toowoomba, where she was presenting the weather from 1975. She joined the ABC in 1986 and last year took to the road with a one-woman show called *Weathering Well*. Jenny is Australia's longest serving weather-presenter.


Great writing is part of great speaking, and Women Writers Qld welcomes new

I was terrified of making a mistake when I took office and, while most of the Critics were helpful and encouraging, some seemed to enjoy cutting us down to size - and we weren't very big! After some time, I thought that perhaps we all took ourselves too seriously, and possibly a lighter approach would be better, so I started to write skits for our Xmas breakups so we could laugh at ourselves. To my amazement some of the senior members eagerly took part and to see them joking about themselves is an experience that I shall never forget. I do feel that, by joining Forum, I have met so many interesting people from so many different backgrounds that my life has been enriched enormously and I really must mention at least one long-term member of

Chermside Forum, Betty Riches, who gave so generously of her own personal "riches" - always being there with help and guidance, and who eagerly embraced change. Overall, it has been a joy to belong to Forum even though, after giving a speech, I still toss and turn in bed at night as I remember the best parts that somehow I managed to leave out! When my husband died a couple of years ago, our 2 sons were not allowed to come from Canberra for the funeral because of Covid and my daughter suggested I do the eulogy. We were also expected to step up automatically to become Committee member, then Treasurer, Secretary, Vice President and finally President. For me, Forum has always been a learning journey, and researching topics for speeches is always interesting. Workshops are helpful and informative and we are so fortunate to have skilful presenters who communicate well. I love meeting new people and catching up with old friends at shared meetings, Conventions and Conferences, and in my early days of membership I was fortunate to meet two of Forum's founders Lady Groom and Ruth Don, both inspiring ladies - but there have been so many inspiring ladies in my journey and we have been so very lucky in having such a plethora of wonderful

leaders to guide us.

Forum has been an important part of my life, guiding me as a member of the Speakers Panel of *Mothers' Union*, and helping me to assist my children with vocabulary and procedure, rules and regulations - along with the help of a well used 1969 copy of "Mr. Chairman" which was written by another of our founders, Marjorie Puregger. Forum has

never been afraid to transform and bring our profile and ideas up to date. It is still alive and active, and may
